Speedo Charity Swim celebrates its silver jubilee

Teams from the House of Lords and House of Commons are getting ready to battle it out once again for the Speedo Charity Shield.

This year's silver jubilee event at the Porchester Hall, London on Wednesday 16 November 2011 promises to be a particularly glittering occasion, raising much needed funds to help disadvantaged young people in Northern Ireland.

Attended by Irish and British celebrities from stage, screen and sport, members of both Houses of Parliament and, we hope, the trust's patrons, including Gloria Hunniford, Joanna Lumley and Barry McGuigan, this is an event not to be missed!

A champagne reception is followed by the swimming races, which includes the fiercely contested battle between teams from the House of Lords and the House of Commons. Guests will then enjoy dinner and dancing in the magnificent Porchester Hall before bidding starts at our charity auction.

In 2009 we raised over £30,000 from ticket sales, donations and the auction, with bidders walking away with some fabulous lots, including a day's racing-yacht charter with crew (donated by Ondeck), a trip for 12 on a private gullet cruise in Turkey (donated by Salamander Voyages), and a weekend for 12 in the west wing at Crom Castle (donated by Viscount Crichton).



And it's all for a good cause. Proceeds from the event go directly to cross-community groups in Northern Ireland who are giving disadvantaged young people vital opportunities to develop life-skills, self-esteem and confidence. 
Chairman's column

Hope for Youth 2010 Grant Awards update

Thanks to your support, we can support projects that help hundreds of disadvantaged young people in Northern Ireland to learn new skills, build friendships across divides and discover hidden talents. These reports demonstrate how our 2010 grants were used during the course of the year.

Falls Community Council

The Falls Community Council has successfully brought together two communities who've been involved in sectarian riots at the Upper Whiterock Road interface in Belfast. The aim was to involve the young people in a drama project that would help them explore the negative effects of sectarianism and gain acceptance of each other.

After initial auditions, 22 young people from the Upper Springfield and Springmartin areas were invited to attend rehearsals for a performance of 'Billy Elliot' where the troubles of Northern Ireland replaced the original 1984-85 miner's strike theme.

The final show was attended by over 200 residents from both communities in a neutral venue. Steven Corr, who ran this project, says 'The young people have had their sectarian values and attitudes listened to and challenged. Working together on this play they've developed a new understanding and acceptance of each other and discovered commonalities.'

Habitat for Humanity NI

Our grant to Habitat for Humanity NI has helped 250 young people from 22 schools (on all sides of the sectarian divide) to get to know each other in an experiential three-day education programme.



They were encouraged to look at issues surrounding local poverty and conflict, to articulate their visions for a better society and to identify ways they can help. On day two of the programme, they joined workers on Habitat's Madrid Street self-build project in East Belfast, where volunteers and families-inneed from both Protestant and Catholic interface communities are working together to create affordable homes.

Peter Anderson says 'The education programme for young people has received a lot of positive feedback and has been a great success.'

Hope Centre, Ballymena

The Hope Centre, which supports families affected by addiction, has recently opened The Hub for children aged 11 to 17 years. Here they can access a range of activities, one-to-one support and advice on issues surrounding substance misuse. And thanks to your support, they're now completing a new dance and drama studio.

The children are full of enthusiasm for dancing and have recently created their own dance troop, complete with outfits. When their choreographed routine is complete, they'll produce a DVD for families and friends, with all proceeds going to charity. They'll also perform at the Peace in the Park Fun Day in August, hosted by Ballymena Council,

The International School of Peace and the Hope Centre. Anne Henry of the Hope Centre says 'The studio is a hit with the children. It's a place to have fun, learn their dance routines and meet friends in a safe environment, rather than on the streets'.

Music Theatre 4Uth Aim High Outreach Programme






With the help of the HFY grant, MT4Uth's Aim High project is working with disadvantaged young people from divided communities in Northern Ireland to rehearse and perform musicals.

Their first project brought together young people from The Ardoyne, New Lodge and Mount Vernon areas, to rehearse and perform at 'The Celebrate North Belfast Festival' in August, where their showcase was the highlight of the evening.

They've also worked with 30 young people in Strabane in County Tyrone, who performed hits from the musical Oklahoma at The Alley Theatre, after attending two workshops with Artistic Director Jeremy James Taylor OBE (founder of the National Youth Music Theatre). In addition, they're running a cross-community weekend workshop in spring 2011, where young people from all over Belfast

will work on hits from The Wizard of Oz. Erika Reid says 'The cross-community projects reach young people in deprived areas who'll never otherwise get these opportunities, despite having talent. Through performance musicals they've developed social skills and confidence that will really help them to get on in life'.



Oh Yeah! Music Centre Volume Control

The Oh Yeah Music Centre's 'Volume Control' project gives young people the opportunity to socialise, work and

enjoy live-music together in a safe and alcoholfree environment. The scheme also incorporates mentoring in event management and live-music performance, which is a real bonus for young people from disadvantaged backgrounds.

Over 30 young bands have been given a platform to perform to over 1000 people, but it's also given the participants experience in areas such as sound engineering and publicity, which could help them find work in the industry.

Michael Culbert, aged 16, says 'There is nothing for our age group to do at the weekend. When we want to see our favourite local bands, we can't, because they play at venues for over 18s only. Volume Control is amazing and there is always a really good line up. I've told all my friends about it who now come down to the gigs.'

The Playhouse, Derry 'Between us' Project

The 'Between us' Project at The Playhouse theatre has run a series of two-hour drama workshops with 16 young people from disadvantaged and interface areas in Derry Londonderry.

The workshops were designed to help them express their experiences and thoughts on the Northern Irish conflict through storytelling and improvisation. They're now developing their work into a play, which examines both the effect of the conflict and the issue of graffiti. It will tour at Easter, with the aim of bringing young audiences in schools and youth groups closer to an empathetic understanding of the suffering caused by conflict.

Following the performance, the audience and young cast will have time to discuss the issues raised. They'll be invited up into the performance space to rehearse their own ways to acknowledge suffering, understand different perspectives and support those who've been involved.

Sliabh Beagh Development Association

The Buzz Project

The 'Buzz Project' runs a series of workshops for young people encompassing a variety of art forms, including visual arts, circus, hip hop dance, percussion and an 'arts' garden, engaging over 80 young people from disadvantaged and interface areas.

Many of these workshops have already resulted in performances, drawing local residents together to witness their friends and family's new skills and friendships.

Donna Bannon, who co-ordinates the project says 'This project has been highly successful so far in terms of experience and the artistic merit of the work produced. All of the participating young people have relayed positive feedback and enjoyed participating.'

Prime Cut Productions Demeter Outreach Project

Working with the Ardoyne Women's Group, Dee Street Community Group, Newhill Community Group and Ardmonagh Family Centre in Belfast,



the Demeter project selected two groups of women from each area to participate in a drama project designed to increase pride and understanding of their local communities, and in Belfast. One group represented young people aged 14 to 17, the other of women over 55.

A series of drama workshops was held in each of the areas, followed by a residential workshop which brought all of the groups together. Each explored their own stories, helping to break down prejudices and give insight into the culture of each community. Importantly, both generations were given an opportunity to reevaluate misconceptions of women whom they live alongside, but rarely interact with.

Their stories and experiences were developed into a play, which was performed at Old Northern Bank Building on Donegall Street, Belfast in May.

Tinderbox Theatre Revolution Project



The Revolution Project has seen 15 young people from the Lower Shankill and Markets communities working together with participants from Bangor, Carryduff and West Belfast to produce the stage play, RJ's Leaving Day.

Entirely written by its young cast of performers, with expert guidance from Tinderbox Theatre Company's Outreach Director, Ciaran McQuillan, RJ's Leaving Day dramatises the frustrations felt by young people at their lack of a role in society, and how little say they have in the decisions that affect their lives.

This is the first time most of the participants have written or performed a play, but it culminated in them being invited to Stormont to perform it in front of an audience made up of MLAs and other dignatories.

Ciaran McQuillan says 'I've been impressed with the passion and commitment of the young people involved in this project. They have really embraced the opportunity to dramatise some of the issues which concern them and it should give those in authority plenty to think about.'

Youth Initiatives **One World Service Trip Preparation Project**



12 young women aged 16-18, selected from Downpatrick, East Belfast and West Belfast Youth Initiatives projects, were given a life-changing opportunity to participate in a two-week service project in Lusaka, Zambia.

Their grant from HFY helped to provide vital preparation workshops and two residential weekends in Northern Ireland to help the girls to get to know one another, plan fundraising events, and discuss issues surrounding cultural exchange, the importance of community and working for the good of others.

manage a typical budget for a family in Africa, taking into account rent, school fees, clothing, and to divide their wage, leaving enough to feed the family at the end of the day. At the end of the

exercise, this amount was given to them to spend on their own supper. Activities like this encouraged the girls to pull together to solve problems, as well as work through issues of social class, cultural experiences and their own upbringing.

The overall experience has brought together a group of young women from across Protestant, Catholic, working class and middle class backgrounds and broken down their prejudices. Lifelong friendships have been built.

Reach Across, Derry **Community Relations and Increased Skills Project (CRISP)**



The CRISP project brings together young people from disadvantaged areas in Derry (where opportunities for personal development and creativity are limited) for fun, cross-community training programmes.

Over 40 young people joined the programme which included a creative dance course, a drama and script-writing course, band skills, and a catering course called 'Cook-it'.

A showcase finale in spring 2011 allowed all of the participants to display their new talents. But they were also involved in planning the event, designing tickets and posters, booking the venue, recruiting volunteers and hiring the equipment. On the night, the performance groups entertained the audience while the Cook-it group prepped and served a fabulous buffet to enjoy during the interval!

Apart from being hugely enjoyable, the young people have really benefited from the whole experience in terms of their self-esteem, confidence and skills. Opening up these opportunities for young people in interface areas is vital to the future health of Northern Ireland, so please continue to support the trust.

Private gallery view and reception raises over £6,500
